Music for the Nativity: The Adoration of the Christ Child

Today we celebrate a special birth in song. Only once in history has there been such a momentous delivery, venerated for more than two millennia. The music that you will hear today is a glimpse of the celebration, the wonder, the awe and the adoration of all who visited Mary, Joseph and the Holy Child in the manger at Bethlehem. Kings, shepherds and wise men who came brought gifts to honor the Christ Child. Our gift, like that of the Angels that night, is music. We come with bells, with horns, with the mighty organ, and with many voices.

The ringing of bells is a long-standing Christmas tradition that reaches back to the first Christmas when legend has it that bells everywhere rang at the birth of the Christ Child. We are pleased to have the ringers of the United Methodist Church Bell Choir, under the direction of Amy Harpster, open our program with selections from *Ring Together Christmas*.

The choral part of our program opens with *Milford*, an early American carol and "fuging tune" that recounts the birth, as many carols do. *Riu Riu Chiu* is a traditional Spanish carol. The title phrase does not translate into English and is meant to evoke the call of the nightingale. Legends of the Nativity of Christ include the miracle of animals talking. In this case it is the nightingale singing about God's protection of the Holy Family from the wolf. In Villa-Lobos' beautiful *Praesepe* we sing of the irony of the humble birth of the King and the adoration of the Baby by the old man who owns the stable. The text comes from the 1563 "Poem to the Virgin" by Fr. Jose de Anchieta. Fr. Anchieta, a missionary to Brazil and a very gifted poet, uses double meanings of much of the Latin text to offer a dramatic, ironic and poignant glimpse of the birth through the experience of the man who owned the stable.

In *Thou Must Leave Thy Lowly Dwelling*, subtitled "The Shepherds' Farewell to the Holy Family" from the larger work "The Childhood of Christ," Hector Berlioz considers the thoughts of the Shepherds as they say goodbye after adoring the Christ child. Joining us again this year, by popular demand, is the *Pinnacle Brass*, a student brass quintet from Ithaca College. Their musical offerings will be *Scherzo* and a setting of one of the oldest traditional carols, *Greensleeves*. The *Nativity Madrigals*, using Norma Farber's na-

tivity poems from her book "A Birth in the Family," give composer Daniel Pinkham the opportunity for a unique perspective on the reactions of animals and others sharing the stable that night.

Unto Us is Born a Son is a modern setting of an ancient tune that was first set on paper in the 1582 Sacred Latin collection "Piae Cantiones." Will Wickham's The Blessed Dawn offers a quiet peak at the humble beginnings of "so great a king" while his Gloria recalls the song of adoration offered by the "multitude of heavenly hosts" on that great day.

The Chancel Choir of the Methodist Church, under the direction of organist and choirmaster David Peckham, offers two selections: Your Song in Me and The Christmas Hymn (The Echo Carol), two of their favorite musical offerings. The Cantata Singers and the Chancel Choir combine forces to offer two traditional works from the British Isles. In the Bleak Midwinter is a setting of a traditional English carol and from Scotland comes What Strangers are These - a glorious setting of text that speaks of the many visitors that night.

It is often said that Christmas is for children. Amy Harpster leads the Children's Choir in selections from *Archangel Gabriel's Awesome Adventure*, a Christmas musical that will be presented here at the Methodist Church. Since a 'merry organ' is an important part of the tradition of sound that celebrates the miracle of the Nativity, David Peckham presents an organ setting of *Bring a Torch*, *Jeanette Isabella* for our celebration.

Last, and definitely not least, what is Christmas if not a community event? Please join all of us as we conclude our celebration with traditional carols. Join with us in the music of celebration: the adoration of the birth of Christ, the miracle birth that saves the world.
